This course is asynchronous online for the full semester. The course does not have a regular meeting time; however, lessons and assignments will be made available each week during the semester. **NOTE**: This is not a selfpaced course and the student must follow the course schedule.

Course Communication

All course communication between the students and courses instructors/TAs will be through Laulima.

The instructors and TAs will be checking the forum at least once a day to reply to your questions. Before posting, please review the Q&A forum to see if your question has been answered. Do not use personal/university emails to communicate with the instructors/TAs unless it is regarding a private/personal matter

Lessons

All lessons and materials will be delivered via laulima and published on the left column of the site. Every Thursday (unless notified), we will make new lessons available that you are expected to complete in the following week. You will have two weeks to complete each lesson assignment and quiz, but if you do not do it in one week, you will quickly fall behind in the class. Furthermore, when an exam is scheduled, you will be responsible for the lessons provided prior to the exam (in some cases provided one week earlier).

Quarters

The semester will be divided into quarters (see the schedule below). At the end of each quarter, there will be an exam given through laulima. Your grade will be evaluated after each quarter so that you will have regular feedback on how you are doing in the class.

Quizzes = 10%

Extra Credit = 10%

Each **exam** will cover all material presented in the given Quarter, and there will not be a cumulative final exam in the class. See the class schedule below for the dates of the exams and what they cover. Exams will be available via laulima on the day of the exam (it will open at 12:01am HST on the assigned day and close at 11:59pm HST on the assigned day). This means that you can begin the exam at the time that is best for you. However, each exam is timed, so once you begin taking it, you will have a set amount of time to complete it.

All **assignments** must be completed by the assigned due date.

Quizzes are given as part of each lesson, and they must be completed by the due date.

Your **participation** score is based on your contributions to the Class Discussion Groups for each Quarter. To earn 3% of the participation each quarter requires that you start at least 2 conversations (1 every ~2 weeks) in your group forum and reply to at least 12 topic messages (~4 per week). All posts above those numbers will increase your score to a maximum of 15% for the semester.

Extra Credit is available that could raise your score a full letter grade. Due to COVID-19, we have had to shift this class to fully online quickly, and we want your feedback to make it better. As such, we are providing you an incentive to increase your grade by 10% by by providing detailed feedback (2-3 sentences) on each lesson. For every lesson you provide feedback you can earn extra credit for each lesson. Honest feedback will receive credit; however, statements like "I liked it!" will not receive credit without an explanation for why you are saying that. If you provide feedback to at least 22 lessons, you will receive a full 10% added to your grade. Do not worry that you should only list what you like. Your extra credit score is based

solely on that you provided an explanation for your score. If you don't like a lesson (or any aspect), say why. Negative feedback is welcome.

Assignment Descriptions

Midterms: Questions will be in any of the following formats -- multiple choice, true/false, short answer.

Assignments: Will vary for each assignment; however, most will be to write a detailed response to a query.

Quizzes: Questions will be in any of the following formats -- multiple choice, true/false, short answer

Participation: Posts to the forum may be via text, video, audio, or photos.

- will be unavailable on a daily basis from 3:00am-4:00am Hawaii Standard Time for server backup and maintenance.
- automatically logs you out if it does not detect activity for two hours. A warning message will appear notifying you of the lack of activity.
 Activity is defined as clicking a button in Laulima such as "Save Draft" or "Next" (in a test), clicking on a course tab, or taking an action that sends information to the server.

Course Goals

This course addresses the need for the students to understand the concepts of sustainability and the history of sustainable practices across a wide range of cultures; this knowledge will allow you to be informed, active participants in efforts to address future global environmental change and to develop sustainable solutions.

This course focuses on the use of scientific tools to study how past civilizations and cultures impacted both the environment and environmental resources through their use of environmentally sustainable or nonsustainable practices.

There are three areas of focus for the course: (1) investigation of historical case studies to demonstrate how cultures and societies from pre-historic times to near-present-day have used resources in sustainable or unsustainable ways; (2) discussion of general sustainability concepts and how they apply to discussions of how past societies and cultures impacted and controlled their environments; and (3) consideration of the tools and data used to determine past environmental change (both human-induced and non-human-related forcings such as natural climate change).

Course Learning Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Provide a simple and clear definition of societal sustainability.

- 2. Explain the underlying principles of societal sustainability and resilience, particularly with regards to environmental change prior to the year 1500.
- 3. Explain the major means by which societies have been undermined by both humanly induced and natural environmental change, and provide examples of such occurrences from before the year 1500.
- 4. Explain the factors commonly responsible for societal collapse, and provide examples from before the year 1500.
- 5. Discuss the major features of global environmental change over the past 200,000 years (with a focus on the interval between 15,000 to 1,500 years before present) and how these changes affected people and societies.
- 6. Critically read and evaluate quantitative and qualitative information (such as figures and graphs) presented at the public level concerning issues of climate, environmental change, and the sustainability and resilience of cultures, societies, and resources.
